The cremated remains were found in storage and ended up at various funeral homes before 12/13/14 coming to Medical Lake.



Operation Family Caregiver—Making a Difference in WA



OPERATION now offered in FAMILY CAREGIVER Washington.

Being thrust into the role of caregiving for a veteran can be overwhelming, and Operation Family Caregiver (OFC) offers practical assistance to make the transition smoother. Created at the Rosalynn Carter Institute for Caregiving, and funded by the Bob Woodruff Foundation, this program is now offered in Washington State through a partnership with Easterseals Washington.

A program of The Rosalynn Carter Institute for Caregiving

Institute for Caregiving With OFC, a specially trained Caregiver Coach provides one-on-one, free and confidential support to anyone caring for a service member or veteran with service-related injuries, both

seen and unseen. The key is to provide evidence-based problem-solving strategies for anyone who has taken on the responsibility of helping a service member or veteran get through each day. Outcomes include caregivers who report lower daily stress, higher satisfaction with life, and improved health.

Meredith McMackin, an OFC Caregiver Coach and Gold Star and Blue Star Mother, understands the pressures of caregiving and the hesitancy to ask for help. She uses the



OFC tools in the way that is most convenient and comfortable for the caregiver. "We often meet virtually or check in through quick phone calls," Meredith comments. "We brainstorm creative ideas to solve problems ranging from inaccessible living areas to jam-packed schedules, and we emphasize self-care and stress reduction. The sessions are focused and pro-active!

Bring your DD Form 214 that shows "honorable" or "general under honorable conditions" status to a <u>driver licensing office</u>. If you don't have your DD Form 214 you can <u>request your military service</u> <u>records online, by mail, or by fax</u> (archives.gov).

Federal VA Unveils Claims Submission Option to **Complete Claims within 30 Days**

As part of the Department of Veterans Affairs' (VA) continued efforts to improve timeliness of services for Veterans and their families, VA unveiled the Decision Ready Claims (DRC) initiative, a disability claims submission option with accredited Veterans Service Organizations (VSO) that promises to deliver faster claims decisions to Veterans and their families.

"The DRC initiative is a collaborative effort between VA and VSOs to help Veterans receive faster decisions on disability claims," said VA Secretary Dr. David J. Shulkin. "VA works closely with participating VSOs to make sure they are properly trained in this new process and given the tools they need to participate successfully in the program on behalf of the Veterans they serve."

Veterans who choose to submit their claim under DRC can expect to receive a decision within 30 days from the time VA receives the claim. VSOs will ensure all supporting evidence — such as medical exams, military service records, etc. — is included with the claim submission. This advance preparation by the VSOs allows claims to be assigned immediately to claims processors for a quick decision.

DRC was first implemented May 1, 2017, at the St. Paul (Minn.) Regional Office, and is now available at all VA regional offices. While DRC is currently limited to claims for increased compensation (commonly known as claims for increase), and requires Veterans to work with VSOs, VA's goal is to expand the types of claims accepted under the initiative and allow Veterans other ways to submit their claim under DRC.

DRC is another key step in aggressively modernizing VA's benefits delivery to Veterans in a fully digital operating environment. With electronic claims processing as a foundation, VA's innovation will improve service to Veterans, their families, and survivors.

2017 Women Veterans Summit held in Lynnwood



The 2017 Women Veterans Summit was recently held on September 16. 2017 at the Lynnwood Convention Center with hundreds of women veterans in attendance.

This year's theme was "It's All About Us...Our Self-Awareness, Self-Love, Self -Confidence...It's Time to Be Good to Ourselves," and breakout sessions were taught on career development, VA Benefits & Resources and suicide awareness. Shellie Willis, provided the event's keynote presentation from

Redefining Your Future, which works to Empower service women, women veterans, and military spouses to transition while completely redefining their lifestyles and perspectives following military service.

Civil War Veteran PVT Zachariah Stucker Honored





For 103 years, the cremated remains of the Civil War veteran were forgotten in storage, ending up at the historic Lake View Cemetery on Seattle's Capitol Hill.

No one came forward to lay claim to the remains of Pvt. Zachariah M. Stucker. So at the cemetery they were stored in an aboveground crypt, along with 1,700 other unclaimed souls.

"It was 100 years of dust, and some human ash, as unfortunately the urns had had many moves and gotten scattered a little," says

Loretta-Marie Dimond, of Kent.

There, in a copper utility box, wrapped in paper, placed in a cardboard box, were the ashes of Stucker.

Dimond and her husband, Jim, both in their early 60s, both history majors in college, have made it their passion to find a resting place for Civil War veterans.

"It was the most important event in American history. It created the nature of the federal union, changed it from the United States 'are' to the United States 'is,' " she says.

On September 28th, their hours of research, along with that of others who search for veterans never laid to rest in this country, such as the <u>Missing in America Project</u>, culminated in the interment of Pvt. Stucker.

It was done with full military honors at the Veterans Home Cemetery near the <u>Washington Veterans Home</u> in Port Orchard. Some 400 people attended, many of them vets with their "Vietnam vet" or "U.S. submarine veteran" caps. Some were in wheelchairs and it was with slow motion that they'd take off their caps when the national anthem was played. READ MORE: <u>Via Seattle Times</u>


2017 POW/MIA Recognition Event

2017 Tribal Veterans Summit

The Washington Department of Veterans Affairs (WDVA) participated in the 2017 Washington State Native American Veterans Summit on September 26-27.

This event was hosted by the Suquamish Tribe in Suquamish WA and cosponsored by the Washington Department of Veterans Affairs and the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs Office of Tribal Government Relations.



The purpose of this event was to share knowledge on



federal and state benefits and programs available to American Indian and Alaska Native veterans including service-connected disability and nonservice-connected pension benefits, and to develop collaborative approaches to supporting these veterans in their own communities.

This event also helped tribal, federal, and state leaders in the veterans community to

develop a better network of veterans service providers and also provided an opportunity for these service providers to learn about and celebrate American Indian culture and history in order to better serve these veterans and their families.

There are approximately 6,000 American Indian and Alaskan Native veterans in Washington State. America Indians and Alaska Natives serve in the United States armed forces at a higher rate than any other ethnic population and they have access to some unique programs in order to better meet their needs in their communities, in addition to having the same access to all the other veterans benefits that any veteran is eligible for.



Earlier this year the Suquamish Tribe became the first American Indian tribe in Washington State to enter into a memorandum of agreement with the Washington Department of Veterans Affairs, which was made possible by recent Federal rule changes that allow accredited state veterans agencies, such as WDVA, to



extend accreditation to Tribal Veterans Representatives and Service Officers.
